# Message from the President

California is in the midst of a water crisis that is impacting our economic vitality, environment, and quality of life. Together, our volunteer Board and membership can work collaboratively with our Managing Director and Legislative and Regulatory Advocate staff to better position our message with the public and various stakeholder interests, and with the State and federal governments. Undoubtedly, the continued support of our parent organization, the WateReuse Association and its research arm the WateReuse Research Foundation, will be an essential part of successfully implementing our five-year plan.

### I. Introduction

WateReuse California's Strategic and Business Plan is a policy document which will focus our Board, staff, committees and membership in leading and managing our organization in a comprehensive and integrated manner. The following sections provide information on the mission, vision and history of WateReuse California and give direction on the organization's goals and financial plan.

#### A. Mission Statement

To promote the responsible stewardship of California's water resources by maximizing the safe, practical and beneficial use of recycled water and by supporting the efforts of the Watereuse Association.

#### **B. Vision Statement**

The vision of WateReuse is to be the leading voice for reclamation, recycling, reuse and desalination in the development and utilization of new sources of high quality water.

### II. History of WateReuse California

The WateReuse Association of California was formed in December 1990 when the Association of Water Reclamation Agencies (AWRA), a policy and regulatory organization, merged with the California Association of Reclamation Entities of Water (CAREW), a technical organization.

The WateReuse Association of California was primarily a volunteer organization. Membership included water, wastewater and reclamation agencies throughout California and affiliated organizations, such as technical engineering and consulting firms. The activities of the WateReuse Association of California were under the direction of an elected Board of Directors. A part-time Executive Director was employed to manage day-to-day activities and assist with many of the regulatory challenges facing water reuse within California. In addition, the WateReuse Association of California engaged the services of a lobbying firm to spearhead a legislative agenda aimed at removing unnecessary barriers to safe and practical water reuse throughout the State. Over the past twenty years, the WateReuse Association and its members have been responsible for a series of beneficial legislation and funding mechanisms that have assisted in the increased beneficial use of recycled water throughout the State of California.



In 1993, the Association formed an affiliate organization, the WateReuse Foundation, purpose of which is to conduct applied research on alternative water supplies such as the use of recycled water.

Recognizing that national perspectives were influencing the water reuse activities in California and that an opportunity to open up access to additional resources, such as funding opportunities existed at the national level, the WateReuse Board of Directors met in Phoenix, Arizona in March 1999 to consider two significant policy decisions:

- 1. Whether to endeavor to become a national organization; and
- 2. Whether to hire a full-time Executive Director.

The Board of Directors of the WateReuse Association of California voted to expand to become a national organization, leading to reincorporation as the WateReuse Association in April 2000. The Board of Directors of the WateReuse Association hired its first full-time Executive Director on August 1, 2000. The addition of an Executive Director provided the WateReuse Association with a presence in the Washington DC area, and a new home office was established near the nation's capital. Since 2000, the staff and operations have continued to expand with a current full-time staff of nine professionals located in the WateReuse Association's headquarters in Alexandria, Virginia.

During the establishment of the WateReuse Association as a national organization the Board of Directors also recognized that it was vital to maintain and continue to expand its activities in California. As part of becoming a national organization, bylaws were developed to have a national organization comprised of state sections. At the same time as a national organization was established, the WateReuse Association, California Section was established. The California Section was led by its own Board of Trustees, which included many of the Board of Directors that guided the growth of the organization from its early years.

The WateReuse Association, and therefore its state sections, is a trade association and is recognized as a tax exempt organization under Section 501(c)6 of the Internal Revenue Code. As a 501(c)6 organization the Association's designation allows it to engage in advocacy and lobbying at both the national and state levels of government.

The WateReuse Association, California Section has consistently been at forefront of both legislative and regulatory activities related to the promotion of the safe, practical and beneficial use of recycled water in California. While the roots of the organization of being primarily a volunteer organization have never changed, the California Section has employed the services of both legislative and regulatory advocates in support of the Section's mission and the goals of the membership.



In 2009, the WateReuse Association, California Section was officially renamed WateReuse California. Also in 2009 another important step was taken, the hiring of a part-time Managing Director for WateReuse California. Through each of these very important steps over the past twenty years, the visions and objectives of the leadership that gave life to the WateReuse Association have been maintained and are now a fixture of the recycled water landscape on both a national and state level.

# III. Goals of the Strategic Plan

- Industry Advocacy: To maintain leadership as the premier legislative, regulatory and policy advocate for water recycling and other alternative sustainable water supplies for California.
- 2. Water Recycling Resource: To be the primary "go-to" information resource about water recycling for legislators, regulators, government agencies, consultants and the public.
- 3. Membership Value: To better serve the membership by continuing to attract top water industry professionals to serve on the Board of Trustees, providing a financially stable organization, and having an effective management structure.
- Education and Outreach: Target key policy-makers to promote recycling. Support issue- and project-specific communication by members.

## IV. Organization and Governance

### A. Bylaws

WateReuse California operates in conformance with our bylaws with the WateReuse Association. The bylaws were revised during our Annual Membership Meeting in March 2009, and are included as Appendix A to this plan. The bylaws include Articles that address the following topics:

#### **B.** Board of Trustees

The WateReuse California Board of Trustees is comprised of four or more At-Large Trustees and a Chapter Trustee representing each Chapter. Officers include a President, President-elect, Past-President, Secretary, Treasurer and Director to the WateReuse Association's Board of Directors. At-Large Trustees and officers are elected by the membership at WateReuse California's Annual meeting that is conducted in association with the annual California Conference. The Chapter Trustees are selected by each chapter using their own selection process and the chapter may designate an At-Large Trustee to be their representative. Additional information regarding the Board are detailed in Article VII of the bylaws.

#### C. Committees

The Board of Trustees operates several committees.

**Executive Committee** – this committee is comprised of voting members including the President, President-Elect, Immediate Past President, Secretary, Treasurer, Legislative/Regulatory Committee Chair and the Director. The Managing Director participates on the Executive Committee as a non-voting member. The Executive Committee meets monthly to manage the day-to-day affairs of Watereuse California

**Standing Committees** – two standing committees exist, the Legislative/Regulatory Committee and the Nominating Committee.

- Leg/Reg Committee is comprised of Board and Chapter members and is
  focused on advancing the legislative and regulatory principles and agenda of
  WateReuse California. The focus of the legislative agenda is on implementing
  law that will promote water reuse and desalination, including funding
  mechanism. The regulatory agenda is focused on eliminating barriers to
  water recycling and desalination that may exist within the regulatory
  framework of state and local government agencies with regulatory authority.
- Nominating Committee is comprised of Board members annually appointed by the President and develops and recommends a slate of At-Large Trustees and Officers for election by the membership.

Ad-Hoc Committees – the President and Board can also designate other committees to perform duties, as assigned. Following its 2009 Strategic Planning Session, the Board identified the following committees and their respective focus. In addition, the President has identified a Board Chair for each committee and each Chapter is invited to designate its membership to each committee. This approach is intended to better represent the breadth and depth of our regional issues, and extend the resources available to WateReuse California. The committees include:



- Membership Committee the focus of this important committee is on recruiting and maintaining our California Membership. This committee will look for ways to grow the organization by recruiting new members and by forming new chapters, where appropriate. In addition, this committee will listen to the needs of our members and find ways to enhance service from WateReuse California, to increase the value of maintaining a membership.
- Conference Committee this committee has the responsibility for planning and executing our annual conference, and other specialty conferences and training programs that will be considered each year. Because the annual conference is hosted by a different chapter each year, the composition of the annual conference committee is expected to rotate to the chapter hosting the conference, under the leadership of the committee chair and appointed conference chair(s).
- Communications Committee the communications committee has several areas of focus including crafting messages for our Membership and Conference Committees, and in promoting public education and outreach related to water recycling.

These committees are considered appropriate for 2014 – 2018.

### D. Local Chapters

WateReuse California encourages the formation of local chapters, which represent defined geographical areas of the State. Each local chapter coordinates its activities with WateReuse California's Board and in accordance with a Memorandum of Understanding developed pursuant to the Bylaws of the Association. At the time of writing this Strategic and Business Plan, there are six existing chapters: Central Valley/Sacramento, Inland Empire, Los Angles, Northern California, Orange County and San Diego.

#### **E. Direct Potable Reuse Initiative**

After developing direct potable reuse (DPR) since 2009, WateReuse California joined with the WateReuse Research Foundation to form the Direct Potable Reuse Initiative. A memorandum of understanding (attached as Appendix B), describing the roles of WateReuse California and the Foundation, and DPR

Business Plan (attached as Appendix C) were developed. Fundraising efforts to date have met plan and facilitate a higher profile for WateReuse California in the legislative, regulatory and political environments of California. The goal of the Initiative is to create a regulatory and policy foundation so that direct potable reuse is an option available to water utilities by 2016.

### V. Objectives for 2014-2018 Business Plan

The WateReuse California 2014-2018 Strategic and Business updates the 2009 – 2014 Business and Strategic Plan. Like those in the 2009 – 2014 Plan, the objectives in the 2014 – 2018 Plan were developed by the Board of Trustees during a Strategic Planning Workshop. Each objective relates to one or more goals of the Strategic Plan: Industry Advocacy, Water Recycling Resource, Membership Value, and Education and Outreach. The basis behind the establishment of the goals and objectives is to expand the use of recycle water in California, including direct potable reuse. The objectives are not listed in a priority or order of importance. The Board's plan is to complete all objectives by the end of 2018. The primary responsible party is in charge of developing a plan and having general direction for completion of the objective. The secondary parties shall assist the primary party in carrying out the objective plan.

#### VI. Financial Plan

The objective of the five year financial plan is to maintain consistency with the Business Plan goals previously discussed within this document. Successful implementation of the Financial Plan contained in the 2009 – 2014 Business and Strategic Plan established robust revenue sources and reserves that vastly strengthened WateReuse California's ability to achieve its goals. The current Financial Plan includes the following strategies:

- Modulate the California Dues Supplement to support essential advocacy activities and avoid contributing to excess reserves;
- Continue specialty conferences and training programs; recruit and retain membership;
- Optimize the expense/revenue strategy of the annual California conference to assure a fulfilling professional development experience for attendees and meet aggressive net revenue goals through sponsorships and exhibitor sales; and
- Strategically expend available resources to maximize benefits (optimal levels
  of involvement by the Managing Director and the Legislative/Regulatory
  Consultant Team) while continuing to fund our reserves in accordance with
  the Board Policy.

The purpose of the reserves is to make up for shortfalls in projected revenues, and provide a source of funds to respond to regulatory and/or legislative opportunities and challenges. Reserves are maintained by the WateReuse Association to provide sufficient funding to ensure that the California Section will be able to meet its contractual obligations. WateReuse California's Reserve Policy is provided in Appendix B

Based on this reserve policy, the required reserves for the California Section typically vary between \$35,000 and \$70,000.



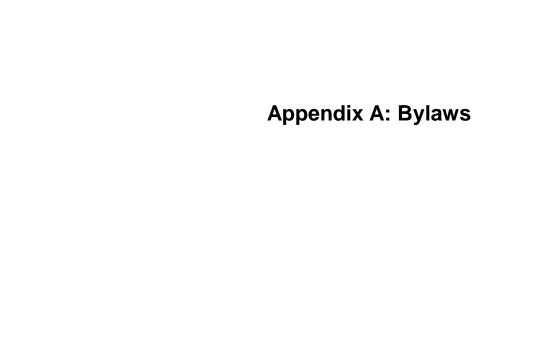

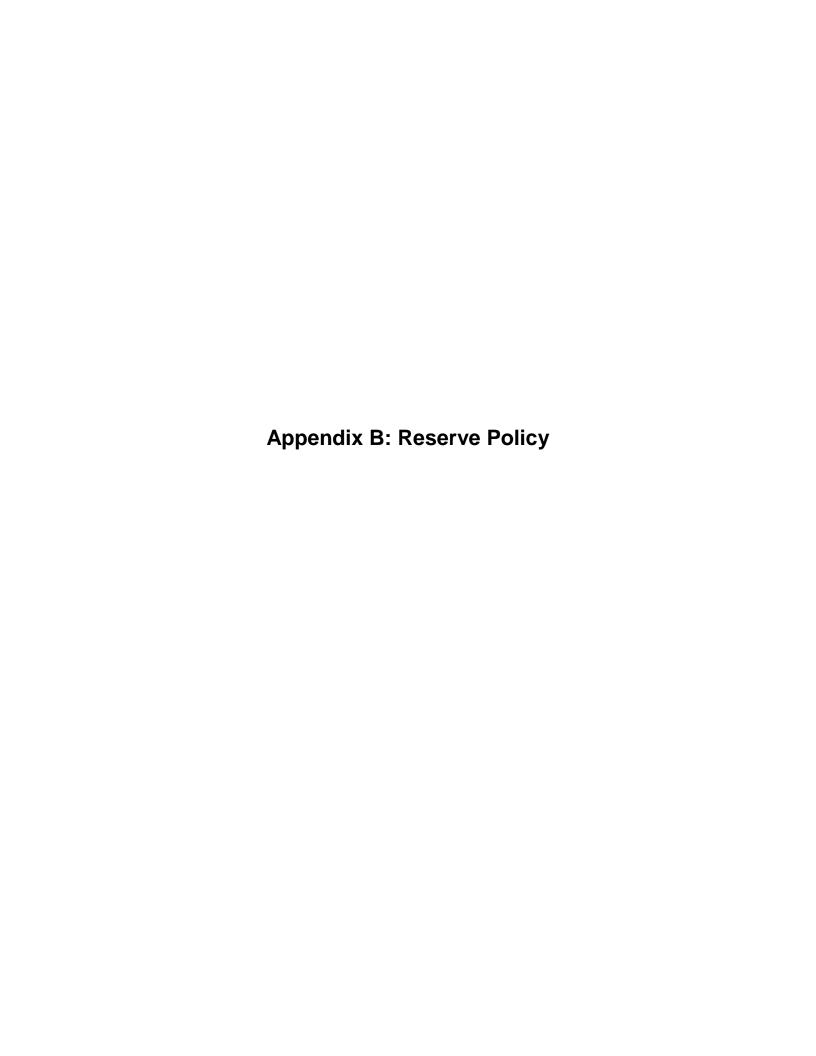

# VII. Implementation

This strategic and business plan is an essential policy document that will help WateReuse's Board to accomplish the goals, objectives and financial plan set forth in the previous sections. Implementation of the plan requires the commitment of the WateReuse's Board, committee chairpersons, local chapters, and our members.





#### WateReuse California Reserve Policy August 2012

#### Introduction and Background

WateReuse California is a designated Section of the WateReuse Association. WateReuse California previously implemented and managed the financial reserves of the Section in accordance with the Reserve Policy adopted by the WateReuse California Board of Trustees on or about the time of the creation of the National Association and the California Section. At that time there was not an Association reserve policy in place; therefore, it was prudent for the California Section to maintain a financial reserve balance that covered the financial and contractual obligations of the Section.

In July 2012 the Association adopted a new "Association Reserve Policy." In general, the newly adopted policy includes reserve allocations for Working Capital at 20% of the prior year's Board of Directors approved budget and Contractual Obligation Reserves that are required to cancel or terminate outside contractual obligations exceeding \$50,000 per obligation. Additionally, the Association may have reserves designated for: Section, Division, and Chapter Reserves; Special Use Designated Reserves, and Undesignated Reserves.

Based on the adoption of the Association Reserve Policy, commitments of the Section including contractual obligations for our Managing Director and Legislative and Regulatory Advocates and conference contractual commitments are included as part of the Association reserves. Therefore, an amended California Section Reserve Policy is recommended.

#### **California Section Reserve Policy**

WateReuse California shall maintain designated financial reserves in the following two categories:

- Operating Reserves: In order to balance income and expenditures on an annual basis WateReuse California shall maintain a reserve balance equal to or greater than ten percent (10%) of the previous year's Board of Trustees approved annual budget. The Operating Reserves are exclusive of any reserve balance included in category 2.
- Special Use Designated Reserves: The Section may fund designated reserves for specific projects or programs. Reserves in this category shall only be used for the designated purpose(s) unless otherwise authorized on a case-by-case basis by twothirds approval vote of the Board of Trustees.
