# Changes in Legislature and in Key Legislative Committees

- Driven by retirements, reappointments, and redistricting
- Currently, 28 members to retire, term out or run for different office ahead of 2022 election
- Assembly Committee leadership changes
  - New Appropriations Chair:
    - Assembly Member Chris Holden
  - New Water, Parks & Wildlife Chair:
    - Assembly Member Rebecca Bauer-Kahan
    - Assembly Member Bauer Kahan has expressed interest in exploring bills for water recycling and desal funding
- New Senate Majority Leader:
  - Senator Mike McGuire










## State Legislative Issues on the Horizon

- AB 1434 (Friedman)
  - Originally proposed targets (prior to DWR recs):
    - January 1, 2023 January 1, 2025, 48 GPCD
    - January 1, 2025 January 1, 2030, 44 GPCD
    - Beginning January 1, 2030, 40 GPCD
  - Arbitrary conservation targets
  - Bill abandoned after being amended to reflect DWR recommendations
- Anticipating similar urban water conservation legislation
  - As of February 15, 2022, no bill introduced
- Notable members of the Legislature calling for investments in water recycling
  - Senator Stern
  - Assembly Member Bauer-Kahan
  - Senator Wieckowski







## **Regulatory Issues on the Horizon**

- Conservation as a California Way of Life
- Ongoing WUE efficiency standards
  - Implementation of AB 1668 (2018) and
    SB 606 (2018)
  - Lack of economic impact analysis
  - Impacts to water affordability and DACs
- Consequences of reduced flows from indoor water use efficiency standards
  - Negative impacts to:
    - Water recycling and wastewater treatment systems







## State Budget Outlook FY 22-23

- CalEPA Secretary Jared Blumenfeld noted that needs for recycled water projects estimated at over \$10 billion
  - \$12 billion in Los Angeles Basin alone
- FY 21-22 drought package contained \$350 million in statewide funding
  - Funding for water recycling coupled with GW cleanup
- FY 22-23 budget does not contain provisions specific to recycled water
- Anticipated federal funding
  - Clean Water SRF
  - California competing with other states for federal funding
- WateReuse California budget request letter
  - \$750 million in grant funding and creation of "large project" funding category



## **Rough Political Climate for Biden & Democrats**

- Low mark for Democratic Congress and Biden White House
  - \$1.75 trillion "Build Back Better" social spending/tax package implosion
  - BBB viewed as the centerpiece of Democrats domestic agenda
  - Democrats unable to pass their landmark voting reform legislation
- Biden disapproval numbers hit a high in January
  - Inflation looms large
- White House/Congressional direction to achieve legislative goals uncertain
- Filling Breyer Supreme Court vacancy presents near-term opportunity for a Biden-Senate Democratic victory

#### **Recycled Water Champion, Senator Alex Padilla**



#### USBR Increased the Title XVI Cap from \$20 million to \$30 million, Jan 14



## Guide Implementation of the IIJA

- Guide the implementation of Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act:
  - Title XVI-WIIN Water Reuse Grant Program, \$550m
  - Large-Scale Water Reuse Projects Grant Program, \$450m
  - Desalination funding, \$250m
  - State Revolving Fund Programs, \$12 B in direct appropriations for each of the SRFs over five years
  - Alternative Water Source Grants Pilot Program, \$125 m (BBB, not yet enacted)





## Working through limitation of "Buy America"


- "Buy America" provisions
  - Applies to all federal agencies
  - Only US made "manufactured products" allowed
  - Limited waiver provisions
  - OMB/Made in America Office required to standardize across agencies by mid-November





## **Interagency Collaboration**

- Guide the establishment and work of the federal Interagency Working Group on Water Reuse
  - IIIJA directs the U.S. EPA to establish the Working Group, and to coordinate with stakeholders
  - EPA expected to set up Working Group in Spring of 2022
- Implementation of the Nation Water Reuse Action Plan (WRAP)
  - WRAP Continues to grow and evolve
  - 21 WateReuse actions moving forward
  - IIJA formalized the WRAP and established the interagency working group on water reuse.






## Waters of the United States

- Waters of the U.S. Rule
  - Submitted public comments on February 7
  - Ask that recycled water systems are excluded from the definition of WOTUS
